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Wine production in Austria increased in 2025

11% more wine produced than the 5-year average; wine stock declined in 2025

Vienna, 2026-02-20 – According to Statistics Austria, 2.56 million hectoliters (hl) of wine were produced in Austria in 2025. Thus, production was 37% higher than the comparatively low volume in 2024 and 11% higher than the average for the past 5 years. Wine stocks stood at 2.65 million hectolitres on 31 July. This is the lowest level in 7 years (–13% compared to 2024; –11% compared to the 5-year average).

In 2025, wine production in Austria increased thanks to favourable weather conditions with fluctuating temperatures, sufficient rainfall, no widespread hail or frost damage, and warm days with cool nights during the ripening phase. Flowering and harvesting occurred within the usual timeframe. Thus, white wine production reached 1.86 million hectolitres, an increase of 44% compared to 2024 and of 15% compared to the 5-year average. Red wine production rose significantly less sharply, by 21% year-on-year, remaining at the 5-year average ($\pm 0\%$) with 701 000 hectolitres.

Growth in all wine regions

In Lower Austria, wine production reached 1.70 million hl in 2025 and was thus 44% higher than in 2024 and 14% above the five-year average. White wine production increased by 46% to 1.37 million hl, while red wine production rose by 34% to 328 500 hl. The wine growing region Weinviertel, which occupies around half of the federal province's wine area, recorded a 42% increase to 989 300 hl compared to 2024.

Burgenland achieved a wine production of 582 900 hl, +16% compared to 2024, but was the only federal province not to exceed the 5-year average (–1%). Red wine accounted for 316 700 hl (+6% compared to 2024), while white wine showed a more significant increase of 29%, reaching 266 300 hl.

In Styria, wine production amounted to 244 700 hl. This was significantly above the previous year's production (+54%) as well as the 5-year average (+18%). Of this, 198 100 hl were white wine (+54% compared to 2024) and 46 600 hl were red wine (+53% compared to 2024).

In Vienna, 30 200 hl of wine were produced, representing an increase of 38% compared to the previous year and 27% compared to the 5-year average. White wine accounted for 23 300 hl (+28% compared to 2024) and red wine for 6 900 hl (+89% compared to 2024).

2.27 million hectolitres of quality and superior quality wine (Qualitäts- und Prädikatswein)

Production of quality and superior quality wines ("Qualitäts- und Prädikatswein") rose by 30% year-on-year to 2.27 million hectolitres (+6% compared to the 5-year average). White "Qualitäts- und Prädikatswein" rose by 38% to 1.69 million hl, while high-quality red wines rose by 11% to 582 300 hl compared to 2024. In addition, 244 800 hl "Wein/Landwein" (table wine and wine without geographical label, including varietal wine and must) were produced (+182% compared to 2024).

Wine stock decreases

The wine stock in 2025 (as of 31 July 2025) fell to 2.65 million hl, partly due to the poor 2024 wine production, reaching its lowest level in 7 years (–13% compared to 2024; –11% compared to the 5-year average). Of this, 1.42 million hl were white wine (–18% compared to 2024) and 1.23 million hl were red wine (–6%

compared to 2024). The stock of “Qualitäts- und Prädikatswein” decreased to 2.11 million hl (–14% compared to 2024; –12% compared to the 5-year average). This consisted of 1.07 million hl of white wine and 1.04 million hl of red wine. The stock of “Wein/Landwein” fell by 7% compared to the previous year, to 258 300 hl.

Information on methodology: Final results of wine production and wine stock are taken from the wine database of the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry, Climate and Environmental Protection, Regions and Water Management (BMLUK), which is based on the annual declarations of wine production and wine stock in accordance with the Wine Law (Weingesetz 2009) as amended.
