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Inflation at 3.2% in March 2026

Higher fuel and heating oil prices caused inflation to rise by 1 percentage point

Vienna, 2026-04-16 – According to Statistics Austria, the consumer price index (CPI 2025) reached 102.6 points in March 2026. Thus, prices were 3.2% higher on average than one year earlier. Compared to the previous month February 2026, the average price level increased by 1.2%. The harmonised index of consumer prices (HICP 2025) stood at 3.1%.

“In March 2026, inflation rose to 3.2%, which was 0.1 percentage points higher than expected in the flash estimate at the end of March. In February, inflation had stood at 2.2%. This increase of a full percentage point compared with the previous month was driven almost entirely by the sharp rise in fuel and heating oil prices. However, the main driver of inflation remained the above-average rise in service prices. Price pressure on food, on the other hand, slightly eased in March,” says Manuela Lenk, Director General Statistics at Statistics Austria.

In March 2026, transport had the most significant upward impact on inflation (+6.4% compared to March 2025; fuels +17.5%, air tickets +7.9%, second-hand passenger cars +5.0%, maintenance and repair of personal transport equipment +4.2%), followed by restaurants and accommodation services (+5.1%; food and beverage serving services +5.2%, accommodation services +5.5%). The third strongest contributor to price increases was housing, water, electricity as well as gas and other fuels (+2.7%; actual rental payments made for housing +4.6%, maintenance, repair and security of the dwelling +2.6%, electricity, gas and other fuels +0.3%, including liquid fuels +38.2%, solid fuels +8.6%, other energy for heating and cooling +2.4%, gas +2.0%, electricity –8.3%). Prices for recreation, sport and culture showed a price increase of 3.2% (package holidays +8.1%, recreational services +2.8%). Food and non-alcoholic beverages rose by 2.3% (food +2.2%, non-alcoholic beverages +2.9%).

The index level of the harmonised index of consumer prices (HICP 2025) was 102.59 in March 2026 (February 2026: revised 101.45), with a harmonised inflation rate of 3.1% (February: 2.3%).

Information on methodology, definitions: A new index period with the base year 2025 has been published for the CPI since January 2026. Previous time series are continued concatenated. Each index series is labelled with the base year, i.e. the average annual measure of the new consumer price index 2025 (CPI 2025) is standardised to 100.0 for the base year 2025. The HICP has been published also with the base year 2025 (since January 2026)

New classification: With the January 2026 index, COICOP18/ECOICOP vers.2 replaces the COICOP 1999 version. This results in a new assignment of basket items to ECOICOPvers.2 aggregates. From January 2026 onwards, there are 13 main groups instead of 12. The old classification with the 12 main groups ends in 2025. Old ECOICOP aggregates cannot be directly compared with the new aggregates. The structure and a reconciliation table are available in the classification database [classification database](#). The **inflation rate** is the average price development over a twelve-month period.

Harmonised index of consumer prices (HICP): Differences between the consumer price index (CPI) and the EU-wide comparable harmonised index of consumer prices (HICP) are primarily based on weighting differences. While the CPI only takes into account households living in Austria, the HICP also covers expenditure by non-resident tourists.
